
The challenge isn't just access—it's access to *high-quality, compassionate care*. Thank you for helping us pass the torch to the next generation of African medical leaders.

interested in surgery during medical school at Hope Africa University.

I did my internship at Kibuye Hospital, which is located in a rural area of Burundi, my home country. At that time, there was no pediatric surgeon in the whole nation. I saw many children in great need of operations. There is one child I will never forget. She had undergone multiple

surgeries that were not done by a pediatric surgeon because there was none in the region. We could not help this child. It was too late. I told myself, "I will focus on pediatric surgery and help my community."

As I look ahead to my third year of training at AIC Kijabe Hospital in Kenya, I'm excited to learn more about excellence in managing my patients with a holistic approach. I learn a lot from my mentors. This I consider priceless.

# You were there for Winjoy when her grandmother could not afford her surgery.

ake one look at her big, bright smile and you'll see: it's no wonder this girl was named Winjoy. The 3-year-old from Kenya must surely win joy in the heart of every person she meets. So . . . meet Winjoy!

Can you picture it? Winjoy Jerono arrives at AIC Kapsowar Hospital in January of 2023. Her grandmother accompanies her. At this moment, Winjoy is not herself. She's crying tears of pain. An accident has left her arm severely injured.

When the doctor shares the bad news of a broken bone, Winjoy's grandmother gasps at the cost of the surgery: \$646. A humble, small-scale farmer



with a small plot of land, she can't afford that cost. She barely gets by selling her vegetables, sorghum, and millet to pay Winjoy's school fees. There's little left over. Certainly nowhere near \$646. That amount almost equals the per capita income of

this region in western Kenya—a year's income to fix a broken arm!

So Winjoy's grandmother does the only thing she can think to do: she asks the doctor if she can take Winjoy home to heal without surgery.

Imagine how difficult this must have been—with no hope in sight and Winjoy still in pain.

The doctor said he must refuse the request. The splint that the hospital staff had given Winjoy would not ensure correct alignment. Winjoy could only heal properly if she underwent surgery.



You helped heal Winjoy's broken bone—and restored the joy she shares wherever she goes.

What could her grandmother do? She didn't know. But we did. **She could rely on YOU.** 

You were there for Winjoy and her grandmother. You were there when the surgeons—empowered by you through AMH's Surgical Access For Everyone (SAFE) program—performed the surgery that set things right again for Winjoy.

# You were there for Yusef when he required life-saving chemotherapy far from home.

usef is a bright, happy, energetic 12-yearold boy who loves math and playing games with his brothers and sisters. All was well until Yusef felt a strange swelling in his neck and hips.

His father, Maki, took him to a local clinic in their home village of Korongo in Sudan. That's where they learned the scary truth: Yusef's lymph nodes were swollen because he'd developed lymphoma, a treatable cancer of the immune system.

Yusef and Maki traveled a **three days' journey by foot** to Gidel Mother of Mercy Hospital, the only place in the region that offers chemotherapy.

Immediately, Dr. Tom Catena and his colleagues started Yusef on chemo for his curable condition. He has responded well and is eager to return to school. The whole family is beside themselves

with joy. "I'm very grateful," Maki said, "for the treatment Yusef has been receiving here from Dr. Tom."



onditions in Sudan remain highly unstable as the war rages on and the humanitarian crisis worsens.

Amid the chaos, Gidel Mother of Mercy Hospital is an oasis for the 2 million people we already serve, including more than seven hundred thousand displaced persons fleeing violence. More of them arrive every day. Thanks to your kindness, the team at Gidel is able to offer dignity, safety, and healing.

Even during this tragic season, we are making significant progress. Gidel is treating malaria, performing surgeries, delivering babies, feeding the hungry, training health workers, and overseeing community clinics.

Surgical care at Gidel Hospital is highly costeffective. According to researchers from Duke

If you're lucky, you never have to think about oxygen. You take it for granted. It's invisible and plentiful. And it's free. Except...not always. Not medical oxygen. Especially in Africa.

Suppose you need surgery. Or suppose you contract severe pneumonia. You soon learn that oxygen is an essential medicine.

But if you live in Africa, you have to hope you're one of the lucky ones. Because in Africa, only one in five health facilities has any medical oxygen to offer patients.

Can you imagine a child dying of pneumonia simply because she happens to live near *this* hospital instead of *that* hospital? A life on the line—decided by a "coin flip."

It's unacceptable.

That's why, in 2020, African Mission Healthcare initiated the O2 Africa campaign, a strategic program to serve sub-Saharan Africa by constructing five oxygen plants to supply area hospitals.

Today, thanks to your kindness, all five oxygen plants are fully operational. Many lives have already been saved. We are eager to save many more, with your support.

## You were there for Angela when she could not breathe.

ittle Angela has sickle cell disease, a common condition in areas with high rates of malaria.

Sometimes, her red blood cells deform, blocking her vessels and leading to extreme pain and even life-threateningly low levels of oxygen.

During Angela's latest "sickle cell crisis," she and her mother walked two hours to Nkhoma Hospital in Malawi. The hospital's caring and competent staff gave Angela oxygen and intravenous fluids. Thanks to AMH and its supporters, the oxygen came straight from the wall. It was right there at hand, ready and waiting to be used in this critical moment of need. Today, Angela has recovered and is excited about being back in school.

After your generous contributions funded the oxygen plant's planning and design ... and the hospital's electrical system upgrade ... and the staff's training ... an anxious mother looked on as her little girl received this miraculous gift we all take for granted.

You were there. Your compassion saved her life—thank you!

# You were there for Agatha and her newborn twins during an urgent C-section delivery.

At 27, she's worked hard just to be able to keep working hard, proudly.

It started when Agatha was a little girl. Her parents died. She and her siblings were left to fend for themselves. One of them did not survive. Undefeated, Agatha focused on school. But that, too, was a challenge. Sometimes, she'd spend weeks at home because she had no way to pay school fees. Only after local well-wishers helped did Agatha graduate from high school.

After marrying, Agatha and her husband migrated in search of a piece of arable land that they could afford. They found a one-room rental house and acquired a small plot where they cultivate food for home consumption and sell the surplus to sustain their family. The couple now have five children, including two sets of twins.

It's the youngest set of twins you helped bring safely into the world at Rwibaale Hospital in Uganda. One of the babies had a "face presentation." A C-section was necessary to prevent life-threatening injuries during delivery.

Just as Agatha felt alone when her parents died—and later when she could not afford to pay her school fees—she was confronted with that awful sinking feeling of being hopelessly alone yet again. How could she ever find the money to

pay for this unexpected surgery? She could not.

But you were there for Agatha. Because of your generosity, the doctors successfully performed the urgent C-section for Agatha. Because of your love, mother and newborn twins are happy and healthy together at home. Agatha is so very grateful that her family is safe, sound, and whole—and their future is wide open.

Agatha prays that "the good Lord may continue to bless the people [who are there for her family] with good health and their heartfelt desires."

erry day in Uganda, men, women, and children of all ages travel many miles, often by foot, to access quality medical care.

When they arrive at Rwibaale Health Centre, you are there. They can sense your kindness.

Rwibaale serves women from all over southwestern Uganda, refugees from Burundi and Rwanda, and patients seeking care from Congo. Because of you, we can meet their urgent needs. Your generosity continues to transform the hospital. In 2024, we will open the new Rwibaale Birthing Centre.

You will be there as each new baby is delivered safely. And you will be there as each pregnant woman who needs an emergency C-section gets the care she needs and deserves.

These moms will not have to become just another number—the 1 in 41 lifetime risk an African woman has of dying in childbirth. That is more than 70 times the risk of dying in childbirth here in the

West. Thanks to you, doctors and nurses feel confident they will have what they need to care for these women and newborns: baby weighing machines, infant beds, C-section instruments, oxygen concentrators, electrosurgery equipment, and more.

It's why Sister Dr. Margaret, an intern now at Rwibaale Health Centre, says to you, "Today I have great joy in my heart. I am very proud. May God reward you beyond measure."

### And yet the need remains vast and urgent.

Please, will you help?

### Here are our most pressing needs:

Protecting Maternal and Child Health (including deliveries, C-sections, and birth injury surgeries): Over the course of her lifetime, 1 in every 41 women will die from a pregnancy-related cause. In Uganda, 80% of the women who need a C-section cannot access one. The result is that one in every 50 women in western Uganda suffers from a birth injury. And neonatal mortality rates remain stubbornly high.

#### **Outfitting New Birthing Center to Open in**

**December at Rwibaale:** Still needed is essential equipment including baby weighing machines, *C*-section instruments, oxygen concentrators, and electrosurgery equipment.

### Preparing More Hospitals to Become Training Centers to Transform Medical Education in Africa:

Our trainees have made over 1 million surgeries possible. This impact is wonderful, but it's just the beginning. Thousands more trainees and millions more surgeries are urgently needed.



### Some impactful ways you can help right now:

### \$29 monthly

covers the cost to safely deliver 12 babies in Africa every year.

### \$50 monthly

gives 60 Malawian children access to malaria treatment every year.

### \$100 monthly

keeps a rural clinic in the Nuba Mountains of Sudan open for 21 days.

### \$250 monthly

saves the lives of Ugandan mothers and their babies by covering 12 C-sections every year.

### \$500 monthly

trains 12 clinicians in Kenya, who will provide care for 2,500 HIV-infected patients every year.

### \$5,000

pays for the operating theater lights at the new birthing center in Uganda.

### \$10,000

distributes 285 oxygen cylinders in Malawi, enough to treat 385 children with pneumonia.

#### \$30,000

sponsors 60 surgeries in Malawi, where only 3% of those needing surgery receive it. This also enhances training for 5 Malawian surgical residents.
